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Program Description:

The Psychology Honors program leads to a Bachelor of Arts degree and is designed to give students an understanding of the methods of psychological inquiry and the state of knowledge in the science of behavior and mental processes. The major offers the background required for graduate work in psychology and also preparation for such related fields as social work, business, medicine, marketing, law, criminal justice, and education. Psychology Honors students take the same set of required core courses as Psychology majors. In addition, they take two seminar courses that allow students to gain experience with graduate-style courses. They also complete a two-semester research project under the mentorship of a Psychology faculty member. Like the Psychology major, the program emphasizes a broad scholarly foundation across the chief areas of psychology, depth of learning in students' chosen direction, and hands-on opportunities for skill-building integrated throughout the program.
