School Principal Internship Mentor

It is recommended that principal mentors have a minim of six years of experice and hold an Administrative II certification, haveparticipated in Pennsylvania Irised Leadership Programs, and quality performance ratings within their dist, and have reviewed the IUP Principal Certification Program Handbook and Intehip Handbook.
