individuals. The distinction there is that IUP must be united in this effort, and he believes it can be. Student-centeredness is the North Star that will guide IUP to a brighter future, he said.

The future is an often-discussed topic at IUP. Things are challenging now, and they could be even more challenging as IUP progresses, but he believes it is headed for better days.

Overall enrollment is projected to come in between 8,800 and 8,900 students, which is a drop from last year. But IUP is facing possibly the most difficult time in decades for recruiting and retaining students. A dwindling Pennsylvania population, particularly in terms of young people, has made things hard enough. It certainly is student centered. Although it will cost IUP revenue in the short-term, the belief is that the long-term payoff will be seen when students see and hear about the value not just of an education, but of an IUP education, and they want to be a part of this world. Some amazing things are done here, and always will be, Dr. Driscoll said.

While IUP is working hard to rein in spending and maximize revenue to improve its financial footing, there was a boost over the summer when the state legislature approved, and Governor Wolfe signed, the fiscal year budget that included a dramatic increase in funding for Pennsylvania public higher education. The 15.7 percent increase i from \$477.5 million to \$552.5 million i will help all of DYbbgmj UbJUbg GhUhY GmghYa cZ <][\Yf 9Xi WUh]cb. Here, the funding, plus the one-time federal funding from COVID itself, will be used to address some of the problems and to do what needs to be done to help students succeed. IUP is still in the planning and organization stage of this, but it is exciting to have such a show of faith by the legislature, the governor, and the people of Pennsylvania, President Driscoll said.

Maura King was appointed chair of the Student Affairs Committee for the 2022-23 academic year. Ms. King presented the following report:

The Student Affairs Committee met today with Vice President for Student Affairs Tom Segar.

The meeting began with opening remarks about the Student Affairs Division.

An update on the Crimson Scholars Circle (CSC) program was presented by members of the CSC Team, led by Vice President Segar. It began with a review of what the CSC is about and its purpose. Details of CSC students in cohort 1 (2021-22) and cohort 2 (2022-23) included information on the number of student scholars and mentors enrolled and on their activities. The program involved the collaboration of several areas of the university, including Admissions, Marketing and Communications, Student Affairs, University Advancement, and the University College. An analysis of data for cohort 1 indicated higher fall-to-fall retention and spring 2022 grade point averages in comparison to similar students who were not in the program. Lessons learned from cohort 1 were used for planning and implementation of the Early Immersion Week and daily schedules for the CSC students in cohort 2. The presentation ended with student testimonials lauding the program.

Athletics Director Todd Garzarelli provided an update on IUP Athletics for fall 2022.
